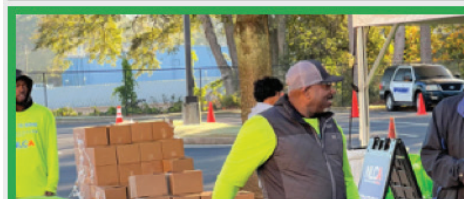
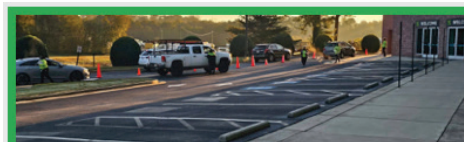
Sharing Thanksgiving Joy: The Stewart Foundation & New Life Church Partner to Feed Families in Need

A Multifaceted Gift of Service: The Stewart Foundation Supports The Smart Place

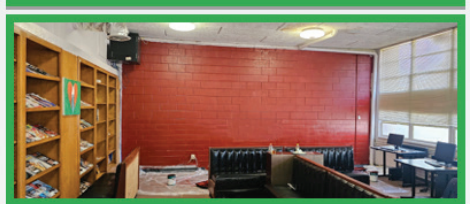
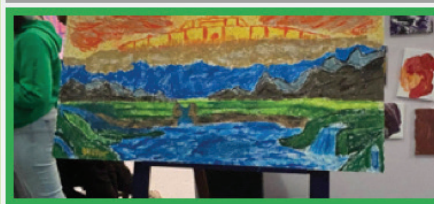
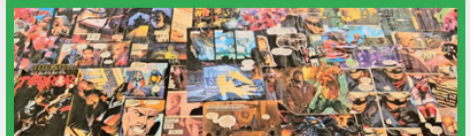

On December 14th, The Stewart Foundation staff, volunteers and youth cabinet were spread out across the city supporting partner organizations to serve our community.

The day began at The Motherless Daughters event at the Hyatt Regency where Dr. Xernona Clayton served as "Mama" Claus. TSF volunteers helped greet families and distribute toys. **Motherless Daughters** is a mentoring program that offers year-round support so that girls can become empowered to embrace every aspect of adolescent life and motivate them to succeed despite challenging circumstances.

Later that evening, Youth Cabinet treasurer Victor Davis, along with his family represented TSF at the 5-Strong Scholarship Gala. **5 Strong** is an organization that is partnered with 14 HBCUs to provide 4-year scholarships, along with mentorship and more to assist with transitioning to college and beyond.

TSF Executive Director and co-founder Gwen Mason served as keynote speaker for The Haitian American Nurses Association of Georgia, Inc (HANA). **HANA**, founded in 2010, is a non-profit membership organization committed to advancing the health and welfare of communities both in Georgia and abroad. Ms. Mason was joined by Foundation Secretary Margie Preston and members of the SF Youth Cabinet.

The evening ended at Porter Sanford Performing Arts Center for "**When Men Speak: A Poetic Exploration**." This event featured the music of saxophonist Mike Phillips and spoken word from Mr. Brown (C.O.C.O.), Malcolm Jamal Warner and our own TSF President and co-founder Hank Stewart. "Eyes, Hearts & Minds OPEN to Our Stories"

1. **"Invincible" by Wade Hudson and EB Lewis** -- Who are the founding fathers and mothers of Black America? "Hudson shows the slow process by which Black Americans fought for justice over the course of many generations. Ending with a call to consciousness and to action, 'Invincible' is a powerful, informative, and inspiring account of a history that deserves to be better known." OUR YOUTH must continue to seek out and spend time with OUR Elders; for so many are willing to SHARE THEIR stories, memories, disappointments, achievements and encouraging words with young people.
2. **"Greatness" by Kahran and Regis Bethencourt** -- "When Nasir and Imani step into their Grandma's studio, she opens their minds to the power of a photograph. From Bessie Smith to Basquiat to Beyoncé, Grandma introduces them to famous figures and what makes them special. And before long, Nasir and Imani find themselves in the images and stepping into greatness, too. True to their iconic photographic style, this picture book from Kahran and Regis Bethencourt reimagines powerful moments from Black history through the eyes of the youngest readers."
3. **"The People Remember" by Ibi Zoboi & Loveis Wise** -- "The People Remember tells the journey of African descendants in America by connecting their history to the seven principles of Kwanzaa. It begins in Africa, where people were taken from their homes and families. They spoke different languages and had different customs."
4. **"Sing a Song: How 'Lift Every Voice and Sing' Inspired Generations" by Kelly Starling Lyons and Keith Mallett** -- "Inspired by this song's enduring significance, Kelly Starling Lyons and Keith Mallett tell a story about the generations of families who gained hope and strength from the song's inspiring words."
5. **"Lift Every Voice: A Celebration of Black Lives" introduced by Nikole Hannah-Jones** -- "For so long, too many stories that reveal what it means and feels like to be Black in America have been overlooked outside Black communities...Lift Every Voice presents interviews with the oldest generation of Black Americans about their lives, their experiences, and the wisdom that can carry all of us to a better future."
6. **"Your Special Voice" by Temi Adamolekin and Keisha Okafor** -- "Inspires young readers to use their own special voice to make a difference in the world. If you want to make a difference, but you don't know where to start, Begin by searching way deep down to find what's in your heart"
7. **"I AM YOU" by Refiloe Moahloli and Zinelda McDonald** -- "In southern Africa, there is a belief called ubuntu -idea that we are all connected. No matter where we're from or who we are, a person is a person through their connections to other people. With simple, lyrical text and charming artwork, this lively picture book first published in South Africa is the perfect introduction to the concept of ubuntu for young kids. A celebration of friendship and kindness, the book shows children the many ways that we are all one."
